In our Early Years Foundation Stage, we aim to create:

- A safe, stimulating, positive and happy environment in which our children can develop socially, emotionally, intellectually and physically to reach their full potential.
- An atmosphere that encourages everyone to value others regardless of ability, race, gender and creed.
- Opportunities that will enable the children to work with increasing independence.

The Foundation Team are friendly and approachable and the environment is always welcoming. We believe, from the very start of school, it is important that children develop positive relationships with adults and each other. All staff work hard to build great relationships with children and their parents/carers. The curriculum in Early Years is very important to us and it is the start to our progressive and sequential curriculum.

Activities to build fine motor skills, creativity, and physical, personal, and social skills are offered alonaside literacu and maths-based learning. Direct teaching takes place in short sessions, while the majority of the time, children are engaged in self-chosen and child initiated learning through play.

We take ideas from the children's interests and environmental influences to develop themes in the continuous provision. We place

> emphasis on the daily teaching of phonics, as well as adult led activities with the whole class and in small groups to build the children's literacy and numeracy skills. Our aim is to engage the children's interest through the provision of exciting and high-quality resources to support them in their learning.



Our school day is designed to maximise learning opportunities and extracurricular activities.

Our school gate opens at 8:30am for children to enter the playground. The doors open at 8.35am every morning where children are encouraged to come into school and start their morning activity. Your child should be at school for 8:40am at the latest when doors close and registers are taken.

The SCHOOL DAY

ACTIVE Travel

Our school sits on a busy residential street with limited parking spaces available. At the start and end of the day, Howlett Drive can become severely congested. If driving, please respect our neighbours and park sensibly. We recommend that you use Active Travel to drop off and pick up your child.



We encourage as many families as possible who live locally to walk to and from school. This not only promotes a healthy lifestyle, but is kind to our neighbours and traffic and pollution levels around school.



School is accessible via several bus routes. The nearest bus stop is Whitehill Lane / Howarth Road, a short walk from school. Bus lines that serve this stop include routes 73, 95, 95s and 207.



UNIFORM

At Whitehill, we believe that our children should be able to wear uniform that is affordable. Whilst branded items are available, these are not compulsory and parents/carers are free to purchase uniform from any suitable retailer.

UNIFORM

- Royal blue jumper or cardigan (school logo is optional)
- White or pale blue polo shirt (school logo is optional)
- Plain grey/black trousers, pinafore dress or skirt/shorts/tights
- Flat, plain black shoes or trainers with black laces / velcro

PE KIT

For reasons of basic health and hygiene it is important that all children have a change of clothes and footwear for PE and games.

This should be:

- A plain white t-shirt
- Black PE shorts
- A plain black or navy tracksuit is essential for outdoor games lessons which take place at all times during the school year

UNIFORM BANK

Regular attendance at school is really important. Research shows that where attendance falls below 95%, there is a clear impact on attainment and wellbeing for the child. The national average for school attendance is around 96% so that is our expectation for every child's attendance. Children are rewarded in a variety of ways for excellent attendance, including certificates and termly prize draws. The school celebrates good attendance on a weekly basis, as well as on our attendance board in the main hall.

DID YOU KNOW?

5 minutes late every day = 3.5 days a year of missed learning 10 minutes late every day = 7.2 days a year 20 minutes late every day = 14.4 days a year

Our school meals are provided by Taylor Shaw Catering and are delicious! We offer a self-selection system, where children choose from 4 main course

options in a morning. We offer a range of puddings and fresh fruit for dessert. The meals are cooked and served on the premises. The menu for the week is displayed in school, distributed to parents regularly and is also available on our school website.

We are a very caring school and we understand the range of difficulties children may face growing up. Teachers are very closely involved with the children and any emotional or behavioural problems quickly come to their attention. If the problem is of a serious nature, parents will be invited into school to discuss the issue.

At the same time, parents are very welcome in school and are asked to inform us of any problems or difficulties which their child is experiencing, inside or outside school, which may affect their education. All teachers accompany their classes out at the end of the school day. Should you wish to speak to your child's teacher, this is the best time to catch them to arrange a time to meet.

Communication to and from school is facilitated through the Dojo app.

SEND

As a school we aim to:

- Ensure that all pupils have access to a broad and balanced curriculum appropriate to the individual's needs and ability.
- Ensure the identification of all pupils requiring SEND provision as early as possible in their school career
- Ensure that SEND pupils take as full a part as possible in all school activities
- Ensure that parents of SEND pupils are kept fully informed of their child's progress and attainment
- Ensure that SEND pupils are involved, where practicable, in decisions affecting their future SEND provision
- Ensure all SEND children make progress and achieve their full potential

Our SEND Coordinator, senior leaders, class teachers and teaching assistants work together with our pupils and their parents to ensure that all children receive the best possible education.

We hold regular drop-in sessions for parents and involve them in every stage of a child's school journey.



ENTITLEMENT

Entitlement opportunities are our core offer: we promise that all students will take part in these experiences during their time at school.

FIRST AID

Our innovative First Aid curriculum, working in partnership with First Aid Schools, aims to develop a continuous and sustainable programme of first aid and mental health first aid training.

MONEY MATTERS

As well as their usual Maths lessons, all students take part in a Money Matters Curriculum. These sessions are delivered in class and link real life financial elements to help prepare all of our students for the real world.

Other Entitlement opportunities include school trips, school performances, specialist PE lessons, careers lessons, visits to places of worship, and rewards and celebration events.





PHYSICAL ACTIVITY AND EDUCATION

Our OAA enrichment activities offer students a variety of taster sessions, both land and water based. We aim to foster a 'can do' attitude in students who might not have previously had the opportunity to take part in adventurous activities. The outdoor education team works across Wickersleu Partnership Trust to deliver educational and developmental activities to students of all ages. These include a range of water sports and land-based activities taking place on schools sites, at Ulley Activity Centre, and outdoor venues across the local area, including the Peak District.

ULLEY COUNTRY PARK

As a part of Wickersley Partnership Trust, Whitehill has exclusive daytime access to Ulley Reservoir, where our dedicated outdoor education practitioners are based. Students are given the opportunity to take part on various water and land based activities, such as raft building, kayaking, canoeing, archery, and indoor climbing (at our Cranworth Road site).

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Our PE curriculum is delivered by a dedicated team of sports coaches provided by WPT. We're lucky that the Rotherham School Games team is also employed by WPT, giving our students even more opportunity to learn new skills, try new sports and activities, and compete with other schools, borough-wide.

SWIMMING

One of our sister schools, Aston Lodge Primary School, has its own swimming pool on-site and all of our students make use of this facility in Year 4, with opportunity to visit the pool in either Year 2 or Year 3.





All students across WPT are promised both Entitlement and Enrichment opportunities.

Enrichment opportunities are the extra-curricular activities that all students will be offered, in addition to the core entitlement.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

Our School Council acts as a representative for all students in school. Students in the School Council make a valuable contribution to the effectiveness of the school, providing an opportunity for students to engage in a structured partnership with the school leadership team. Each school

elect two Student Council members to the Trust Student Council, which meets four times a year.

PERIPATETIC MUSIC

We offer all of our students the chance to be taught an instrument (including woodwind, brass, string, percussion and vocals) by a group of professional music tutors. We currently have many students undertaking weekly 20 minute lessons. Students across all Key Stages are encouraged to take part.

Our ultimate goal is to improve the life chances of our students, both academically and morally. Our students' ongoing learning is our core mission, but wrapped around this is a thriving culture of wellbeing and safety, that is embedded into everything that we do. PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Our personal development curriculum is embedded in daily life. Students are taught, at an age-appropriate level, about relationships, health and wellbeing, and living in the wider world. Students discuss physical and mental wellbeing and how to be an active part of the community. British Values and Protected Characteristics also form a part of our personal development curriculum.

WELLBEING AND SAFETY

The safety and wellbeing of our students (and staff) underpins everything that we do. We use rigorous systems and procedures to ensure that our young people are safeguarded. Children are taught about online and offline safety, and the risks of both. WPT has a dedicated team of specialists who are committed to ensuring that your child's time at school is both academically rewarding and safe.



REWARDS

At Whitehill, we are rightly proud of our wonderful ethos. Positive praise and rewards are central to our success throughout the school. We aim to remind children regularly of the expectations through the 'Whitehill Way' then catch them showing excellent behaviour and reward them.

We have a number of awards for positive behaviour including Dojo point rewards, sticker cards and stickers, certificates, work assemblies, displays and special events held in the Headteachers office. We never underestimate the power of a well-timed and appropriate piece of encouragement and praise. Weekly assemblies for 'Special Mentions' bring the school together to celebrate children's achievements.

RESIDENTIALS

WPT is very proud to have been able to offer every Year 6 student a place at our annual residential completely free of charge. We understand that residentials can be a large financial burden on families, so by removing the financial barrier we can enable all students to participate.
